We also want to honour the lives of the over one thousand two hundred and counting, missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls (MMIWG), and the loss of too many indigenous children, culture, and history to the residential school system.

It's been over 153 years of an ongoing process of colonization and genocide here in Turtle Island and systemic racism and police violence play a huge role in this system of oppression.

Therefore, It is incumbent that those of us who are settlers on this land, continue to advocate for justice for various indigenous communities and support the Indigenous students on our campus. The UTMSU will always be ready to support Indigenous students and community members should they decide to form a campus group here at UTM.
